Fun facts about hearing

As part of our work in 'The World Around Us' this month, we will be learning about hearing. Here are some fun facts to keep you entertained!

- Your ears don't stop hearing when you sleep; your brain chooses to ignore sound.
- Snakes hear through their jawbone and fish hear through ridges on their body because neither have physical ears.
- The smallest bone in the entire human body is situated in the ear; the stapes bone (also known as the stirrup bone) measures just 2.8 mm long!
- The roar that we hear when we place a seashell next to our ear is not the ocean, but rather the sound

of blood surging through the veins in the ear.

We will complete an exciting unit of work on **Fantasy Stories**. During this unit, we will read passages from stories which include strange characters living in the real world. We will find out how the author creates tension and explore the relationship between the character and the setting. We will analyse aspects of writing a fantasy story before we plan and write our very own fantasy story.

We'll continue to work on our phonics, where we'll explore different ways of writing sounds. We will be focussing on **sh / s** and **d**. We'll continue to work on our joined handwriting activities as well.

Numeracy

In our Numeracy activities this month, we will be:

- working really hard to practise quick and accurate recall of all multiplication and division facts for the 2 to 12 times tables;
- completing our work on mental strategies for subtraction involving three-digit numbers;
- ✓ ensuring that we can recognise odd and even numbers up to 1000;
- ✓ learning about **multiples**; and
- ✓ learning about **negative numbers**.

Topic

We'll be completing our topic on '**Sound** and hearing'.

 - 1. How is sound **created**?
 - 2. How do we hear sound?
 - 3. How is sound **measured**?
